

From the Pastor's Pen

The coming of spring brings a re-birth of nature. The trees, plants, and lawns, brown with a hue of death, come alive with shades of green. Spring brings with it hope and the promise of new life. It reminds us that death is not the end of everything but a phase in the cycle of nature. So it is with our lives as human beings. We know one thing for certain: that we will die to life in this world. Death might come in old age or youth or somewhere between; it may come suddenly or over a long period of time; it may come when we are alone or when we are surrounded by loved ones; it may come as part of the ageing process or come unexpectedly. We may be frightened by the thought of death or at peace. So much depends on what we believe about death. For us, peace comes because of our faith. Jesus has come to bring life out of death.

At the heart of our faith is the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. But there are three other accounts about the power of Jesus to bring life out of death. There is the story of an official who begs Jesus to come and pray for his little daughter who has died. On arrival, he announces: "She is not dead, but sleeping." He took her by the hand and she arose. Then in Luke's gospel there is a story of when Jesus and his disciples were traveling to the village of Nain. At the gate a man who had died was being carried to his burial place, the only son of a grieving mother. Jesus told them to halt and said: "Young man, I say to you arise," and the dead man rose. He gave the son to his mother.

Then we have the account that we hear in today's gospel about a dear friend of Jesus named Lazarus who had died, apparently unexpectedly. By the time Jesus hears the news and gets to the place of burial, Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. Jesus tells the onlookers to take away the stone at the entrance of the tomb and then calls out, "Lazarus, come out." To the astonishment of the crowd, Lazarus comes out of tomb, fully alive.

These accounts about the power of Jesus to bring life out of death give us great assurance. They foreshadow the resurrection of Jesus himself, his victory over death. As we approach Easter, we are filled with hope and peace. Jesus promises to us that same victory over death. Resurrection and new life are at the heart of our faith. So we live in a spirit of peace.


What Is A Church?

Someone is Watching and Wondering



Over the past few weeks I think everyone has been affected by Covid-19, either directly or indirectly. Perhaps you have felt the situation is out of control and are unsure what you can or should do. Maybe you have felt sad, depressed, anxious, or even hopeless. Such feelings are

probably normal given the circumstances surrounding this pandemic and the many life changing events each of us have and perhaps continue to encounter. This Sunday we celebrate, the Third Scrutiny with our Elect (those preparing for baptism, confirmation and eucharist at the Easter Vigil). The emphasis of this Scrutiny (the sin of hopelessness) is to understand how we react to our feelings of hopelessness when confronted with situations and events which seem to and in many times are out of our control.

Over a single lifetime you may encounter many acts, events, or situations that seem to be out of your control. To name just a few, there are acts of nature such as floods, tornados, earthquakes; sudden illness; unexpected death of a family member or close friend; senseless killing; starving children; needless suffering; unanticipated loss of a job or income; a cancer diagnosis; consequences of wars; or destruction to the environment. The question being asked when participating in this third scrutiny (examining our conscience to discover this sin) is not "Why do I experience such feelings?" but rather "How do I react to these feelings of hopelessness?"

I believe the true question at the root of this sin is: "Why God are you allowing this to happen?" Blaming God is so easy and may quickly appear in our mind. We even use expressions similar to "It's God's will" and we may admit to being angry with God. Rarely, however, do we admit to being unsure of our trust in God. We struggle with why a loving God allows terrible things to happen. The sin of hopelessness is not having these questions but rather letting them dominate our hearts and minds. The sin of hopelessness is rejecting God's grace and infinite love. I once had a wise person tell me "It's ok to question God but you will probably never get an answer to the 'Why' question." It may be obvious that we cannot fully understand the mind of God, yet isn't this what we demand, an explanation from God. This sin is rooted in original sin and our desire to know like God. We reject our finite humanity. We turn from God and try to muddle through life alone. We forget our universal call to holiness, rooted in our humanity and Christian baptism. In other words, we lose sight of who we are and how God is calling us within the community. For me this scrutiny requires a truthful and deep self awareness as God continues to call me to Live Mercy and Be Holy.

Here's a traditional prayer of spiritual communion that can be prayed daily in atonement for all the profanations and sacrileges He suffers because He wants to be with us."

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.
