

# From the Pastor's Pen

As you know, our pastoral reflections are written days before the Sunday in which they appear in the bulletin. So naturally we are lagging behind in recent events, especially in these days when situations are changing so rapidly. The COVID-19 pandemic continues to affect all areas of our lives, including our parish. We join in prayer that the virus might be contained and that we might be kept safe, always holding each other in prayer.

What will not change is the liturgy of this Third Sunday of Easter. I'd like to reflect a bit on the gospel assigned for this celebration. We are all familiar with the account. In the days after the death and burial of Jesus, two disciples are walking from Jerusalem to Emmaus, stunned by what has happened. Someone they do not recognize joins them and asks about their conversation. When they tell him about the events with regard to Jesus, the stranger interprets for them passages from the Scripture which are about the Messiah. In that telling, their hearts are "burning within them." When they get to their destination, they invite the stranger to stay with them. In the meal, the Risen Lord take bread, blesses it, breaks it, and shares it, actions of Jesus at the Last Supper. In those gestures, they recognize that it is the Risen Lord, but he vanishes from their presence and they hurry back to Jerusalem to tell the others about their experience.

The Church invites all of us to place ourselves in the shoes of those Emmaus disciples. Sometimes we, too, do not recognize the presence of the Risen Lord in the people we walk with, or at least who enter into our lives in some way. One of our most difficult callings is to find the Risen Lord in each person we encounter. A second teaching might be that we find the presence of the Risen Lord in the Scriptures. Sometimes accounts from the Hebrew Scripture (our Old Testament) can be confusing. And yet those events prefigure the coming of the Risen Lord and teach us how these events prepare for the coming of the Risen Lord among us. And finally, and maybe most importantly, is the recognition of the presence of the Risen Lord in the Breaking of the Bread. I think that sometimes the actions of the Mass can become so routine that we fail to meditate carefully on what is happening. We might receive that Broken Bread without much reflection. So the call of this Emmaus event is a reminder to remember that it is the Risen Lord who invites us to His table.

Dan Bacon, Dave Jones, John Jamboretz, Kyle Deere, Clark Kelly, and the tireless pair of Rich Venditti and Rockne Gross have formed, structured, begged, borrowed, and resurrected equipment and garnered the support of our That Man Is You, Knights of Co-

lumbus, Do-Dads groups and other parishioners to keep 10 acres cut and trimmed.

This group of volunteers have joined our landscape team in filling the need and saving a buck for St.

James. Our landscape team, headed by Gretchen Lathrop and Sandy Turner, are continuing their annual tasks of keeping the weeds at bay and the plants healthy. While we have not mentioned all who have been involved, as there is not enough room in



this bulletin, we'll have more on this later.

This task will continue through the dog days of summer and into the fall, giving life to the meaning of church.

Three teams, Red, White, and Blue, have been established and they cut at various times between Thursdays and Saturdays (depending upon the team and free time).

Three riding mowers plus two gas string trimmers have been donated to this effort. Some people are donating money for gas and fertilizer which the parish will purchase. It is expected that Hy-Vee Hope Gifts Cards will be used for the gas (if anyone would like to help out).

Social distancing is not an issue since this is an outside activity and people do not need to work close to each other. However, for safety, workers use the "buddy system" so that no one is alone on the campus. All workers wear long pants, high visibility vests, plus eye and ear protection.

Kyle Deere of Atlas Landscaping or his staff will be mowing closest to the church. The teams will handle the rest.

# Someone is Watching and Wondering



There is nothing more precious and loving than a child, nor a more obvious sign of God's grace. In fact Jesus teaches us to cherish and protect all life. Children's needs are generally obvious, yet adults try to hide theirs. I believe our most basic need is to love and be loved, yet strangely enough, this need is what we often try to hide. Unfortunately many of us have been taught, when confronted with physical or emotional pain, to suck it up, push through it, and not burden others. This seems wrong in so many ways. Didn't Jesus unite himself with our pain and suffering? Aren't we all God's children and doesn't a loving parent embrace his/her child when the child is frightened, anxious, or in pain. Then why do I try to hide my pain?

As we continue the Easter Season I am reminded of God's great, omnipresent love. I am drawn to Jesus on the cross, a freely chosen act, revealing total love on His part. God doesn't demand sacrifice as an act of appeasement. Instead He offers Himself for us. Our meditation on the cross is meant to shock our hearts and turn us not away from suffering, but toward our loving Father. The cross invites us to soften our hearts, not only to the suffering of Jesus, but to all suffering. The cross is meant to hold us in the mystery of pain, to look at pain in its many dimensions, and to learn from Jesus' pain, our pain, and the pain of others. Through the cross, God leads us to a new understanding of compassion and love. He invites us to surrender our hearts to Him, to bring the pain of all who suffer to His cross, to be comforted by His love and mercy.

In Chapter eight of the letter to the Romans, St. Paul writes: "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Verses 37-39) I understand this to mean that God's love is always with us; we cannot fall out of God's love. However, as an act of despair we may try to ignore His love, thinking we are abandoned, and believing that we must suffer alone as a sign of loving God. Nothing is further from the truth. God doesn't abandon His children nor demand suffering. He is always present and His love will bear our pain. As Fr. Mike so frequently proclaims, "Trust God. His love never fails. His love is always constant."

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# We Are The Light: A Beacon of Light At Home Parish Mission April 26 - May 2



During this uncertain time, we are having to adjust our lifestyles. We are doing many things that we would do in community at home: school, work, and worship. Despite not being able to be hand in hand to praise God at Mass, we remain a community of believers . . . We are the church.

The Easter season reminds us that the light of Christ is present even today. Jesus commissioned the Church to bring the light of his Resurrection to the world. We take this week to help us focus on and empower us for this call.

Join us in this mission to enkindle a brighter light inside of ourselves to help make the world around us brighter.

You will be provided with daily activities that you can do on your own time. The activities include a daily prayer, video reflection by a member of our clergy or parish staff, reflection questions, and optional activities.

**Day 1: Foundations of the Call**: Fr. Mike will share about Scriptural connections of light including the first words of God, the coming of Christ, the commissioning of the Church and each person's call to be the light of Christ through Baptism.

**Day 2: Recognizing the Light**: This is about the speaker's life and recognizing the moments of Christ's light through the Church and through other people.

**Day 3: Flaming the Light**: This is about how the speaker enflames the light of Christ in their life through participation in the Sacraments, Scripture, and prayer.

**Day 4: Models of Light**: The speaker will share stories about some Saints and what they say about being the light and how they let their light shine.

**Day 5: Community of Light**: The speaker will discuss how we are called to be an active member of the community in our own way

**Day 6: Sharing the Light**: The speaker will talk about ordinary ways that they share the light in their families, friend groups, and communities.

**Day 7: Living in the Light**: The speaker will provide an opportunity to reflect on the various aspects that have been discussed and how each of us can live in the light.
