## Preparing for Divine Mercy Sunday



In preparation for Divine Mercy Sunday, the Lord asked St. Faustina to make a Novena of Prayer from Good Friday to the following Saturday.
These nine days of prayer before Divine Mercy Sunday are like the nine days of prayer in the Upper Room before the day of Pentecost. For each of the nine days our Lord gave St. Faustina a different intention.
Each of us can make a Novena of Prayer for these intentions and others by praying the novena on pages 7 and 8 of this bulletin.
If you are on the St . James email list you will receive the Novena intentions and prayers for each day beginning on Good Friday.

## A Special Promise of Mercy

Our Lord's promise to grant complete forgiveness of sins and punishment on the Feast of Mercy is recorded three times in the Diary of St. Faustina. I want to grant a complete pardon to the souls that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion on the Feast of My mercy (Diary 1109). Whoever approaches the Fountain of Life on this day will be granted complete forgiveness of sins and punishment (Diary 300).
The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion will obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment (Diary 699).
It's allowed for one to go to confession up to 20 days before or after Divine Mercy Sunday.

## From the Pastor's Pen

You will recall that as we entered Holy Week a year ago, we were under severe restrictions because of the covid pandemic. No public liturgies were allowed, so only six of us were participating, although live streaming was in place. It was such a weird feeling trying to celebrate the most important liturgies of the Church year in a church with no congregation. Something was definitely missing!

The liturgy is the public worship of the Church with disciples of Jesus gathered to celebrate our faith, to honor the Lord, and to support one another in prayer. Although the pandemic is still with us, we take the necessary precautions, now able to gather around the altar, so grateful to be together.

Palm Sunday begins what we call "Holy Week." This year, there is no procession into Mass. Palms will be distributed as congregants enter the church. We all know the history. As Jesus entered Jerusalem, crowds joyfully greeted him, crying out their hosannas. As we read the gospel, the Passion, we find an entirely different mood: condemnation and crowds crying out "Crucify him."

Holy Thursday is significant because of three special memories. First we recall the Last Supper and the institution of the Eucharist. We re-commit ourselves to faith in the very presence of Christ and this special meal of fellowship. Priests also re-commit themselves to the service of God's People. We remember how Christ washed the feet of his apostles, a reminder that we, too, are sent to wash feet, meaning our service to God's People. On Good Friday we remember the passion of the Lord and focus our attention on the cross and the suffering of Jesus. Holy Saturday is the highlight of all the celebrations of the Church Year. We rejoice in the central tenant of our faith: the resurrection of the Lord. Catechumens are welcomed into the Church through the waters of baptism, the Confirmation anointing, and the reception of the Eucharist. Of course on Easter Sunday we renew our baptismal promises and cry out in joy our faith in the resurrection.
Fr. Mike and I hope many blessings come to you in this Holy Week and ask you to participate as fully as you can.

## Someone is Watchins and Wonderins



Today, marks the beginning of Holy Week, our most sacred week of the year. My final Lenten Retreat / Reflection, "A Journey for Seekers" is difficult to write and personal. As I complete this message we passed the first anniversary of declaring COVID-19 a world-wide pandemic. In the United States there have been more than 500,000 confirmed deaths attributed to this virus. I know COVID has touched each of us and our families; I feel blessed that both my son and daughter continue to recover. As I reflect on my feelings of the past twelve months I find similarities to my experiences of this week in Jesus' life. I recognize feelings of exuberance, confusion, fear, depression, and hopelessness.
While today's liturgy begins proclaiming Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, singing Hosannahs, the tone dramatically shifts with the proclamation of His passion. The exuberant rejoicing with palms turns to sadness, fear, a sense of foreboding and loss of hope. How many times have I experienced these feelings the past twelve months? In fact, many times my feelings of despair were accompanied with silent weeping and a sense of abandonment. My hope was replaced with the suffering of life.
Holy week continues with the beginning of the sacred Triduum on Thursday. This liturgy celebrates the mandatum and institution of the Eucharist. Perhaps I share the feelings of Jesus' disciples when I state I am confused. What is Jesus telling me during His actions and discourse at this meal. Putting myself at that table (not looking forward to Easter) I hesitate to understand how am I in receiving Christ's body and blood becoming a servant to others. This year I couldn't visit or care for my son and daughter as they suffered. I was forced to trust the health professionals and wait. My only comfort was the belief they were in God's loving care, yet I felt confused. What was I being asked to do? I sought answers in listening for His voice. Yet as I witnessed the death of so many, fear was always present. I felt anxious and at times depressed. Again perhaps I share the feelings of the disciples as they witnessed the torturous death of their beloved Jesus. Will this suffering ever end? How can I experience a new day with joy? As we buried our dead this past year, were we experiencing hope or simply loss, sorrow, and fear? For me the answer to that question is not simple. When I leave our liturgy on Good Friday I feel a heaviness, darkness, and deep sorrow for what I have lost on this day. I have known these same feelings so many times this past year as I watch the suffering that seemed to surround me. Reflecting on this day, this week, and this past year I feel so much loss. At the same time, witnessing natures' new life rising from the ground and budding forth on trees, I know God is reassuring me that I am not alone. Christ is present, filling the world with grace and love. What are you feeling at this moment?

## Fr. Joe Miller Obituary

 Fr. Joseph Miller, C.PP.S of the Kansas City Province of the Missionaries of the Precious Blood died on March 16, 2021. Fr. Joe was born in Bellevue, Ohio on August 13, 1950 to Alfred and Agnes (Hay) Miller. He entered formation with the Society of the Precious Blood at Brunnerdale Seminary in Canton, Ohio in September 1964, graduated from St. Joseph's College, Rennselaer Ohio in 1973, and became a pledged candidate on May 23,1973. Fr. Joe was definitively incorporated as a Missionary of the Precious Blood on April 15, 1976. He received his Mdiv. in Theology from St. John's University, Collegeville, MN in 1977, and was ordained to the priesthood on June 18, 1977 at Immaculate Conception Church, Bellevue, Ohio.

Fr. Joe's first assignment was associate pastor at Sacred Heart Parish in Sedalia, MO for a month. He was then appointed vocation director for the province, where he served for five years. In 1982 he spent a year teaching math at Precious Blood Seminary in Liberty, Mo. In 1983, Fr. Joe came to St. Francis Xavier Parish in St. Joseph, Mo as associate pastor, where he served for seven years. He then became associate pastor of St. James Church in Liberty, MO for half a year, and spent the other half of the year in a sabbatical program at Notre Dame. In 1991 he began his two years of service as pastor of Immaculate Conception Church in Butternut, WI. From 1993 to 2004 Fr. Joe was pastor at St. Mary's Parish in Centerville, Iowa. His next assignment was as pastor at St. James Parish, Liberty, MO for three years. Then he served as Province Vocation Director for four years (2007-2011), the last year of which he also served as associate pastor of Sacred Heart Church in Sedalia, MO, and the five years after that as pastor of Sacred Heart Church in Warrensburg, MO. In 2016, Fr. Joe began his second term of service at St. Francis Xavier Church in St. Joseph, MO, where he served as pastor till his death.

Fr. Joe was known for his dedication and hard work wherever he served. He was always willing to go where needed, and many were familiar with his sometimes boundless energy and ever-present smile. He was a person of principle, empathetic but clear when speaking of the values by which he lived.

## Fr. Joe served as pastor at St. James from 2004-2007.

The Mass of Christian Burial was held for him at St. James on Monday, March 22.

The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Triduum - from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Saturday. Though chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery.
The single celebration of the Triduum marks the end of the Lenten season, and leads to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord on Easter Sunday.
The Holy Thursday and Good Friday services will be live-streamed on Facebook and YouTube.

## The Triduиm: One Mass ~ Tbree Days

The Triduum is the holiest time in our Liturgical Calendar. It is the most important part of Salvation History as Christ, in those three days, fulfilled the promise of God when He said He would send a Savior who would reconcile humanity to Himself.
There is but one Mass celebrated over 3 days during the Triduum beginning with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday and ending at the close of the Easter Vigil on Saturday
Our Liturgy reflects our solemn, adoring and anguished spirit. The Mass of the Lord's Supper" on Holy Thursday does not "end." There is no "Go forth" or "Thanks be to God." There is only the procession of Christ to His place of repose and the silent, prayerful adoration of the faithful that stay watch with Him as He endures His Passion (akin to the Apostles as Christ led them to the Garden of Gethsemane to keep watch as He began His Agony in the Garden).
On Good Friday, there is "no Mass." This is because technically, the Mass from Holy Thursday has not ended.
Finally, on Saturday, we arrive at our Easter Vigil. This special vigil is held after sundown. This is significant because this darkness is indicative of the spiritual darkness we are experiencing as we await the Light of the World.

This vigil does not start with the typical "opening Mass prayers" we're used to. Instead, the priest blesses a special fire which is typically made of Holy Oils from the previous year, salt, and twigs. This special fire is the first light we see and is symbolic of the Resurrection. This light is what's used to light our brand new Paschal Candle (the Christ Candle), and after the Candle is lit, the light begins to spread throughout the Church, from member to member, as a flame is passed between individual candles all are given at the opening of Mass.
As this Vigil Mass commences, we finally are able to hear again the priest's command to "Go Forth" and respond with a jubilant "Thanks be to God!" We acknowledge that the sacred Triduum that marks Christ's Sacrifice has reached its fulfillment, and we take our charge to "Go Forth" with zeal. We are charged to take the message of Salvation to all people who still "live in darkness."

So, now you see why there is but one Mass celebrated over these three days.
As these three days recall the three long days of Christ's consummation by the Fire of His Love, it is our opportunity to offer these three days in solidarity with Him.

## The Novena to The Divine Mercy

Jesus asked that the Feast of the Divine Mercy be preceded by a Novena to the Divine Mercy which would begin on Good Friday. He gave St. Faustina an intention to pray for on each day of the Novena. In her diary, St. Faustina wrote that Jesus told her: "On each day of the novena you will bring to My heart a different group of souls and you will immerse them in this ocean of My mercy. On each day you will beg My Father, on the strength of My passion, for the graces for these souls."

## First Day - April 2

## Today bring to Me all mankind, especially all sinners, and immerse them in the ocean of My mercy.

Most Merciful Jesus, whose very nature it is to have compassion on us and to forgive us, do not look upon our sins but upon our trust which we place in Your infinite goodness. Receive us all into the abode of Your Most Compassionate Heart, and never let us escape from It. We beg this of You by Your love which unites You to the Father and the Holy Spirit.
Eternal Father, turn Your merciful gaze upon all mankind and especially upon poor sinners, all enfolded in the Most Compassionate Heart of Jesus. For the sake of His sorrowful Passion show us Your mercy, that we may praise the omnipotence of Your mercy for ever and ever. Amen.

## Second Day - April 3

## Today bring to Me the souls of priests and religious, and immerse them in My unfathomable mercy.

Most Merciful Jesus, from whom comes all that is good, increase Your grace in men and women consecrated to Your service, that they may perform worthy works of mercy; and that all who see them may glorify the Father of Mercy who is in heaven.
Eternal Father, turn Your merciful gaze upon the company of chosen ones in Your vineyard upon the souls of priests and religious; and endow them with the strength of Your blessing. For the love of the Heart of Your Son in which they are enfolded, impart to them Your power and light, that they may be able to guide others in the way of salvation and with one voice sing praise to Your boundless mercy for ages without end. Amen.

## Third Day - April 4

## Today bring to Me all devout and faithful souls,

 and immerse them in the ocean of My mercy.Most Merciful Jesus, from the treasury of Your mercy, You impart Your graces in great abundance to each and all. Receive us into the abode of Your Most Compassionate Heart and never let us escape from It. We beg this grace of You by that most wondrous love for the heavenly Father with which Your Heart burns so fiercely.
Eternal Father, turn Your merciful gaze upon faithful souls, as upon the inheritance of Your Son. For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, grant them Your blessing and surround them with Your constant protection.

Thus may they never fail in love or lose the treasure of the holy faith, but rather, with all the hosts of Angels and Saints, may they glorify Your boundless mercy for endless ages. Amen.

## Fourth Day - April 5

## Today bring to Me those who do not believe in God and those who do not yet know Me.

Most compassionate Jesus, You are the Light of the whole world. Receive into the abode of Your Most Compassionate Heart the souls of those who do not believe in God and of those who as yet do not know You. Let the rays of Your grace enlighten them that they, too, together with us, may extol Your wonderful mercy; and do not let them escape from the abode which is Your Most Compassionate Heart.
Eternal Father, turn Your merciful gaze upon the souls of those who do not believe in You, and of those who as yet do not know You, but who are enclosed in the Most Compassionate Heart of Jesus. Draw them to the light of the Gospel. These souls do not know what great happiness it is to love You. Grant that they, too, may extol the generosity of Your mercy for endless ages. Amen.

## Fifth Day - April 6

## Today bring to Me the souls of those who have separated themselves from the Church.

Most Merciful Jesus, Goodness Itself, You do not refuse light to those who seek it of You. Receive into the abode of Your Most Compassionate Heart the souls of those who have separated themselves from Your Church. Draw them by Your light into the unity of the Church, and do not let them escape from the abode of Your Most Compassionate Heart; but bring it about that they, too, come to glorify the generosity of Your mercy.
Eternal Father, turn Your merciful gaze upon the souls of those who have separated themselves from Your Son's Church, who have squandered Your blessings and misused Your graces by obstinately persisting in their errors. Do not look upon their errors, but upon the love of Your own Son and upon His bitter Passion, which He underwent for their sake, since they, too, are enclosed in His Most Compassionate Heart. Bring it about that they also may glorify Your great mercy for endless ages. Amen.

## Sixth Day - April 7

Today bring to Me the meek and humble souls and the souls of little children, and immerse them in my mercy.
Most Merciful Jesus, You yourself have said, "Learn from Me for I am meek and humble of heart." Receive into the abode of Your Most Compassionate Heart all meek and humble souls and the souls of little children. These souls send all heaven into ecstasy and they are the heavenly Father's favorites. They are a sweetsmelling bouquet before the throne of God; God Himself takes delight in their fragrance. These souls have a permanent abode in Your Most Compassionate Heart, O Jesus, and they unceasingly sing out a hymn of love and mercy.
Eternal Father, turn Your merciful gaze upon meek souls, upon humble souls, and upon little children who are enfolded in the abode which is the Most Compassionate Heart of Jesus. These souls bear the closest resemblance to Your Son. Their fragrance rises from the earth and reaches Your very throne. Father of mercy and of all goodness, I beg You by the love You bear these souls and by the delight You take in them: Bless the whole world, that all souls together may sing out the praises of Your mercy for endless ages. Amen.

## Seventh Day - April 8

## Today bring to Me the Souls who especially venerate and glorify My Mercy and immerse them in My mercy.

Most Merciful Jesus, whose Heart is Love Itself, receive into the abode of Your Most Compassionate Heart the souls of those who particularly extol and venerate the greatness of Your mercy. These souls are mighty with the very power of God Himself. In the midst of all afflictions and adversities they go forward, confident of Your mercy; and united to You, O Jesus, they carry all mankind on their shoulders. These souls will not be judged severely, but Your mercy will embrace them as they depart from this life.
Eternal Father, turn Your merciful gaze upon the souls who glorify and venerate Your greatest attribute, that of Your fathomless mercy, and who are enclosed in the Most Compassionate Heart of Jesus. These souls are a living Gospel; their hands are full of deeds of mercy, and their hearts, overflowing with joy, sing a canticle of mercy to You, O Most High! I beg You O God: Show them Your mercy according to the hope and trust they have placed in You. Let there be accomplished in them the promise of Jesus, who said to them that during their life, but especially at the hour of death, the souls who will venerate this fathomless mercy of His, He, Himself, will defend as His glory. Amen.

## Eighth Day - April 9

## Today bring to Me the souls who are in the prison of purgatory, and immerse them in the abyss of My mercy.

Most Merciful Jesus, You Yourself have said that You desire mercy; so I bring into the abode of Your Most Compassionate Heart the souls in Purgatory, souls who are very dear to You, and yet, who must make retribution to Your justice. May the streams of Blood and Water which gushed forth from Your Heart put out the flames of Purgatory, that there, too, the power of Your mercy may be celebrated.
Eternal Father, turn Your merciful gaze upon the souls suffering in Purgatory, who are enfolded in the Most Compassionate Heart of Jesus. I beg You, by the sorrowful Passion of Jesus Your Son, and by all the bitterness with which His most sacred Soul was flooded: Manifest Your mercy to the souls who are under Your just scrutiny. Look upon them in no other way but only through the Wounds of Jesus, Your dearly beloved Son; for we firmly believe that there is no limit to Your goodness and compassion. Amen.

## Ninth Day - April 10

## Today bring to Me the souls who have become

 lukewarm, and immerse them in the abyss of My mercyMost compassionate Jesus, You are Compassion Itself. I bring lukewarm souls into the abode of Your Most Compassionate Heart. In this fire of Your pure love, let these tepid souls who, like corpses, filled You with such deep loathing, be once again set aflame. O Most Compassionate Jesus, exercise the omnipotence of Your mercy and draw them into the very ardor of Your love, and bestow upon them the gift of holy love, for nothing is beyond Your power.
Eternal Father, turn Your merciful gaze upon lukewarm souls who are nonetheless enfolded in the Most Compassionate Heart of Jesus. Father of Mercy, I beg You by the bitter Passion of Your Son and by His three-hour agony on the Cross: Let them, too, glorify the abyss of Your mercy. Amen.

On the large bead after each decade:
Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

On the 10 small beads of each decade:
For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

Conclude with:
Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, Have mercy on us and on the whole world. (Three times)

Birthoays this week: Today we celebrate all that you with Gos's help, have accomplished.
