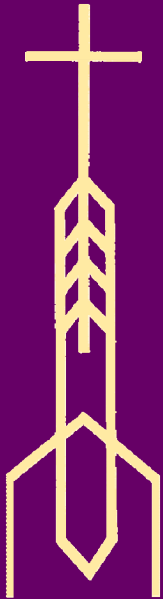

From the Pastor's Pen

All of us are familiar with the season of Lent, the 40-day spiritual journey preceding Easter. Technically, Lent ends with the celebration of the Triduum: Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil. For many Catholics, Lent is taken seriously as a time of penitence and spiritual renewal, disposing followers of Christ to come to the celebration of the Resurrection with a new fervor and deeper faith and with the stronger determination to live by the virtues and values of the gospel.

This First Sunday of Lent begins with the account of the temptation of Jesus by the devil in the desert. The wilderness is a reminder of the testing of the people of Israel during the time of their exodus. In the desert the Israelites sometimes failed the test. They complained. They accused God of abandoning them. They succumbed to idols. Jesus, faithful in doing the Father's will, resisted the wiles of the devil, and won the victory. "Go away, Satan. God alone shall you serve."

In our own lives of discipleship, we are all very much aware of temptations. We are all put to the test in many ways. Sometimes we are tempted to do what threatens our health: eating too much; drinking too much; too little exercise. Or we may be tempted to hurt our relationships: dishonesty, being judgmental, selfishness, pride. And we may be tested in our life of faith: entertaining doubts; the lack of a prayer life; being satisfied with mediocrity and laziness.

Lent challenges us to an examination of conscience. What serious temptations affect us? In what ways are we put to the test? Do we have a plan of resistance, which includes such helps as discipline, prayer, self-denial, generosity? Are we willing to join the parish and Church families in public devotions, such as the rosary and the Stations of the Cross? As we enter this holy season of Lent we ask the Lord for wisdom and strength as we do battle with the demons in our lives.

My prayers are with you each day.

Someone is Watching and Wondering



Searching the internet recently, I found this little picture, and it reminded me of words many of you have heard me speak regarding Lent: "I think that 'giving up something/fasting for Lent'

is a foolish practice that has little meaning and is not much help in furthering your journey toward a richer, fuller relationship with Christ Jesus." If I now have your full attention, please permit me to explain before you angrily stop reading and turn to the next page.

Let me begin by stating that I am not suggesting you ignore the teachings of our Church regarding prayer, fasting, almsgiving, and abstinence during the Lenten season. On the contrary, I am suggesting that we should return to the roots for fasting found in sacred scripture, not just during Lent but throughout every season of the Liturgical year. One scriptural example can be found from the prophet Joel: "Yet even now, says the Lord, **return to me with your whole heart**, with fasting, and weeping, and mourning. Rend your hearts, not your garments, and **return to the Lord, your God**. For gracious and merciful is he, slow to anger, rich in kindness, and relenting in punishment" (2:12-13). For me, this codifies the reason I try to fast, not only from food but from my egotistic manner of superiority, from words and actions that objectify and hurt others, from selfishness and greed, and to a greater extent from failure to recognize God as the center of my life, in whom I can trust, and to whom my love must continue to evolve. Add to this understanding is my personal belief, that although fasting is a focus of Lent, fasting/giving up must be the goal of my entire life. Why try to change only for 40 days? There is a saying that practice makes perfect, so by intensifying my practice of turning away from/fasting from anything which distracts or distorts my relationship with God during Lent, it becomes easier, more perfect to do the same throughout every day of the year, for years to come. Fasting from my self-centered wants and desires helps me **return to the Lord**; dedicate my life and all I have to sharing the Light of Christ, thereby fulfilling my baptismal promises.

As I continue fasting, I remain,

III Pillars of Lent

Prayer

The three traditional pillars of Lenten observance are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. The key to renewed appropriation of these practices is to see their link to baptismal renewal.

Prayer: More time given to prayer during Lent should draw us closer to the Lord. We might pray especially for the grace to live out our baptismal promises more fully. We might pray for the elect who will be baptized at Easter and support their conversion journey by our prayer. We might pray for all those who will celebrate the sacrament of reconciliation with us during Lent that they will be truly renewed in their baptismal commitment.

Fasting: Fasting is one of the most ancient practices linked to Lent. In fact, the paschal fast predates Lent as we know it. The early Church fasted intensely for two days before the celebration of the Easter Vigil. This fast was later extended and became a 40-day period of fasting leading up to Easter. Vatican II called us to renew the observance of the ancient paschal fast: "...let the paschal fast be kept sacred. Let it be celebrated everywhere on Good Friday and, where possible, prolonged throughout Holy Saturday, so that the joys of the Sunday of the Resurrection may be attained with uplifted and clear mind." (Liturgy, # 110).

Fasting

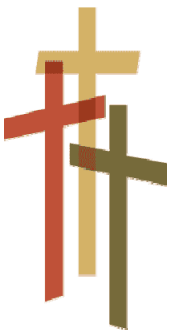
Fasting is more than a means of developing self-control. It is often an aid to prayer, as the pangs of hunger remind us of our hunger for God. Fasting should be linked to our concern for those who are forced to fast by their poverty, those who suffer from the injustices of our economic and political structures, those who are in need for any reason. Fasting can help us realize the suffering that so many people in our world experience every day, and it should lead us to greater efforts to alleviate that suffering.

Abstaining from meat traditionally also linked us to the poor, who could seldom afford meat for their meals. It can do the same today if we remember the purpose of abstinence and embrace it as a spiritual link to those whose diets are sparse and simple. That should be the goal we set for ourselves – a sparse and simple meal. Avoiding meat while eating lobster misses the whole point!

Almsgiving: It should be obvious at this point that almsgiving, the third traditional pillar, is linked to our baptismal commitment in the same way. It is a sign of our care for those in need and an expression of our gratitude for all that God has given to us. Works of charity and the promotion of justice are integral elements of the Christian way of life we began when we were baptized.

Why Attend The Stations of the Cross?



Could you walk a mile in Jesus' shoes? The Stations of the Cross (also known as the Way of the Cross) bring us closer to Christ as we meditate on the great love He showed for us in His most sorrowful Passion!

The Stations of the Cross provide us with great material for prayer and meditation. Tracing Jesus' journey from condemnation to crucifixion increases both our sorrow for our sins and our desire for His help in avoiding temptations and in bearing our own crosses. Meditating on Christ's passion can help us become more like

Him in imitating His virtues of obedience, humility, charity, patience and perseverance.

Pilgrims to the Holy Land commemorated Christ's Passion in a similar manner as early as the 4th century A.D. The Stations of the Cross developed as a devotion in earnest, however, around the 13th to 14th centuries.

It became a way of allowing those who could not make the long, expensive and arduous journey to Jerusalem to make a pilgrimage in prayer, at least, in their own church! Although the original number of stations varied greatly, they became fixed at 14 in the 18th century.

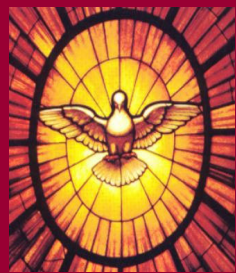

Lenten Observances for Fast and Abstinence

Abstinence From Meat: Every person 14 years or older must abstain from meat (and items made with meat) on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all the Fridays of Lent.

Fasting: Fasting is obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal.

Exceptions: Those who are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the physically or mentally ill including individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also excluded are pregnant or nursing women.
