From the Pastor's Pen

There is probably little to be said about Lent that has not already been said or preached many times. We know that it is a penitential season, focusing on making atonement for sin, preparing for death, reflecting on the suffering of Christ, and looking forward to the celebration of the Resurrection. In the early days of the Church, those who were guilty of serious sin (apostasy, murder, adultery) had to endure a public penance all of Lent, wearing sackcloth and ashes. Less serious sins were forgiven through acts of penitence, prayer, fasting, and the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Holy Thursday was that special day for public sinners to be shrived and to return to full practice of the faith. Easter was, of course, the great day of rejoicing, the celebration of new life.

Today, not much is required of Catholics in the season of Lent. Fasting (eating less, not eating between meals, one major meal a day) is required only on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday for those between the ages of 18 and 59), though most Catholics take seriously the spirit of the Fast. Abstinence (no meat) obliges only on the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday, age 14 and older. More important than observing the Law of Fast and Abstinence is the desire for spiritual growth. There are many practices which help us in this growth: more time for personal prayer; reading and meditating on passages from the Bible; works of charity; celebrating Reconciliation. Most Catholics like to begin Lent by celebrating Mass and receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday, giving public witness of the intention of entering into the spirit of the Lenten season.

Another main focus of Lent is the final days of preparation for Catechumens. There are two categories for those involved: first, those who were never baptized and are preparing for the Sacraments of Initiation, the "Elect." Then there are those who are already baptized in some other Christian denomination and preparing for entrance into the Catholic Church family through the sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist. Our job as parishioners is to support them with our prayers and a welcoming spirit.

Good People of God, may this season of Lent be of great benefit to you as you grow in the depths of faith and commitment.

My prayers are with you daily.



Someone is Watching and Wondering

discernment noun discernment/di-'sərn-mənt the quality of being able to grasp and comprehend what is obscure

During the past several weeks I have written about prayer, which I intended as a prelude to the Lenten season. As you know the three pillars of Lent are Prayer,

Fasting, and Almsgiving. For me prayer is central to my spiritual journey and provides direction for the two other facets of my Lenten journey. Prayer is foremost a conversation with God with an emphasis on listening to God's voice. There are, however, many voices competing for my attention; pushing me this way and that. Discernment is essential, helping me to seek God's guidance in my day to day struggles.

Discernment is a process of intentionally becoming aware how God is present, active, and calling me both as an individual and within community. Discernment involves shifting through the choices and voices in my life. Discernment involves honesty, self-criticism, questions, and a level of discomfort. Discernment requires trusting in the Holy Spirit and accepting that the actions I am being called to may involve trepidation, being out of my comfort zone, and perhaps risking rejection or loss. Yet, before embracing fasting and alms giving I believe I must enter into the discernment process. I must ask these hard questions: "What things/ actions/thoughts/attitudes/behaviors are blocking my faithful relationship to God? How/when do I fail to follow Jesus' commands of self-giving love, forgiveness, and service to others? In what ways do I treat other people in ways I do not wish to be treated?" Asking these questions I feel forced to not only look at personal sins I have knowingly committed, but also my complicity in communal sin where I have failed to act according to my beliefs as a Catholic Christian. At least for me, admitting, naming, and seeking forgiveness for my personal sins is so much easier than admitting and naming my role in communal sinfulness that is so apparent in our communities, nation, and throughout the world. It is painful to discern my reluctancy to actively support immigrants and refugees, the poor and homeless, people living outside the dominant culture fighting for acceptance, understanding, and dignity, and those convicted of violent crimes.

Although I believe every human is created in the image and likeness of God and is a beloved child of God, I know that I fall short of living this belief through my actions. I am guilty of being a willing participant in communal sin whenever I fail to speak the truth of the Gospels and follow my speaking with actions. I pray God will lead me, in spite of my stubborn nature and need to feel comfortable and safe within my self imposed cocoon.

ST. JAMES PASTORAL COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES **MONDAY, FEBRUARY 10, 2025**

Chairperson Joan Peluso called the meeting to order at 7:02pm. Council Members present were Fr. Mike Roach, Deacon Chuck Koesterer, Eddie Baker, Phil Baumert, Kevin Casel, Chris Fullinwider, Betsy Lewey, Yvette Lopez, Joan Peluso, and Corrine Sebranek. The opening prayer was said by Corrine Sebranek.

Guest Report: The council welcomed Amanda Lewey to discuss her duties as Confirmation Coordinator, and some specific details regarding St. James' Confirmation program, and the upcoming Steubenville conference this summer.

Amanda's primary duties are to coordinate the preparation of our students for confirmation, and to plan the confirmation ceremony. Amanda has been the coordinator for 4 years and has been involved for 14 years. Seeing the spiritual growth of the students is the most rewarding part of her job. The diocese has mandated confirmation be moved to students in the 6th grade. Different parishes are working toward this change in different ways. St. James is confirming 8th and 9th graders this year and will then do 7th and 8th next year, 6th and 7th the following year, and settling into 6th grade only going forward. There are currently 120 students in the Confirmation formation program this year, and there will be two services on 2/26 and 3/21. This year's group did a service day in November working on 10 different projects. They recently had a retreat and are continuing their preparation leading up to Confirmation. Amanda is assisted in her duties by a There was substantial discussion about working more group of excellent volunteers (many that don't have students in the program) and is helped administratively by Kirsten Maggi with tracking birth certificates and other paperwork.

Finally, Amanda reported that there are 23 commitments from students to attend the Steubenville Conference this summer in Springfield, MO. Several of the attendees will be attending this conference for the 3rd time. The group had a spaghetti dinner fundraiser and will have another with a pancake feed on Fat Tuesday. They are working to make this event as cost effective as possible, and they are hoping to raise enough money to rent a bus again this year, which makes the trip much easier. The council thanked Amanda for all her good work with the youth of our parish.

New Business:

New Adult Faith Class for Lent: Joan Peluso shared with the Council information from Sherri Porterfield regarding the Adult Faith Study course for Lent, HOW TO LENT. The 4-week course will be held on Wednesday and Thursday evenings from 6:30 - 7:30 in the Parish Hall beginning March 12/13 and concluding April 2/3. Registration online begins on Sunday, Feb-

ruary 23 and will end on Wed., March 5th. In-person registration will be held after all Masses the weekend of February 22/23. Participants will be able to choose between attending on Wednesday or Thursday evenings depending on their schedule.

Old Business:

New Council Member Openings: A current list of candidates to fill open Council member spots was provided by Joan to council members. They have been notified that they will be hearing from Jay in a few weeks. The invitation announcement was repeated before each Mass on the weekend of February 15/16.

Discussion of Future Goals: Members reviewed our Statement of Purpose and Article II of the Bylaws as a guide to set future goals. Several ideas listed below were shared and briefly discussed.

- Blessing of Pets This would be an easy event to set up and a Saturday morning would be best.
- Several items were discussed regarding the parish ministries and their leaders:
 - Potential gathering/dinner for the ministry heads.
 - Reach out to individual ministry heads to see if there was something the PC can assist them with.
 - Possibly have a ministry of the month slot in the bulletin, on the web site, and possibly a quick introduction by a member of the group before Masses once a month.

- Potential for parish retreats throughout the year.
- Guest Speakers It was brought up that there are various speakers that appear at neighboring parishes.
 - The Diocese sends a weekly email talking about events going on in the entire Diocese.
- Anything that the Council can assist with regarding OCIA.

- Potential Advent and Lent family activities



Pillars of Lent

Prayer

Fasting

Almsgiving

The three traditional pillars of Lenten observance are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. The key to renewed appropriation of these practices is to see their link to baptismal renewal.

Prayer: More time given to prayer during Lent should draw us closer to the Lord. We might pray especially for the grace to live out our baptismal promises more fully. We might pray for the elect who will be baptized at Easter and support their conversion journey by our prayer. We might pray for all those who will celebrate the sacrament of reconciliation with us during Lent that they will be truly renewed in their baptismal commitment.

Fasting: Fasting is one of the most ancient practices linked to Lent. In fact, the paschal fast predates Lent as we know it. The early Church fasted intensely for two days before the celebration of the Easter Vigil. This fast was later extended and became a 40-day period of fasting leading up to Easter. Vatican II called us to renew the observance of the ancient paschal fast: "...let the paschal fast be kept sacred. Let it be celebrated everywhere on Good Friday and, where possible, prolonged throughout Holy Saturday, so that the joys of the Sunday of the Resurrection may be attained with uplifted and clear mind." (Liturgy, # 110).

Fasting is more than a means of developing self-control. It is often an aid to prayer, as the pangs of hunger remind us of our hunger for God. Fasting should be linked to our concern for those who are forced to fast by their poverty, those who suffer from the injustices of our economic and political structures, those who are in need for any reason. Fasting can help us realize the suffering that so many people in our world experience every day, and it should lead us to greater efforts to alleviate that suffering.

Abstaining from meat traditionally also linked us to the poor, who could seldom afford meat for their meals. It can do the same today if we remember the purpose of abstinence and embrace it as a spiritual link to those whose diets are sparse and simple. That should be the goal we set for ourselves – a sparse and simple meal. Avoiding meat while eating lobster misses the whole point!

Almsgiving: It should be obvious at this point that almsgiving, the third traditional pillar, is linked to our baptismal commitment in the same way. It is a sign of our care for those in need and an expression of our gratitude for all that God has given to us. Works of charity and the promotion of justice are integral elements of the Christian way of life we began when we were baptized.

Why Attend The Stations of the Cross?



Could you walk a mile in Jesus' shoes? The Stations of the Cross (also known as the Way of the Cross) bring us closer to Christ as we meditate on the great love He showed for us in His most sorrowful Passion!

The Stations of the Cross provide us with great material for prayer and meditation. Tracing Jesus' journey from condemnation to crucifixion increases both our sor-

row for our sins and our desire for His help in avoiding temptations and in bearing our own crosses. Meditating on Christ's passion can help us become more like

Him in imitating His virtues of obedience, humility, charity, patience and perseverance.

Pilgrims to the Holy Land commemorated Christ's Passion in a similar manner as early as the 4th century A.D. The Stations of the Cross developed as a devotion in earnest, however, around the 13th to 14th centuries.

It became a way of allowing those who could not make the long, expensive and arduous journey to Jerusalem to make a pilgrimage in prayer, at least, in their own church! Although the original number of stations varied greatly, they became fixed at 14 in the 18th century.


